Why Complete a Record Book?

A record book is a way for you to learn. Keeping a Cat Project Record Book will help you:

- To organize yourself
- Set reasonable goals for yourself
- Recognize and appreciate what you've learned this year from the goals you reached
- Track your progress and successes from year to year
- Explain what you've learned
- Keep track of your project costs

Guidelines for the Cat Project Record Book:

Start your record book at the beginning of the project year (typically September 1st of year prior to fair) and keep track of all your expenses and receipts during the year. It is important to update your record book monthly. Keep your book neat and complete.

Start the project year by setting goals to complete. These goals could include "Cat Care Skills" or "Personal Development Activities." To expand your horizons, try to accomplish new skills each year you are in the project.

Your record book should be kept in a folder. It is recommended you save your record books from previous years. That way, you can easily compare your progress and achievements throughout your years in the Cat Project Area. It will also help you when you apply for awards, jobs, college, etc.

Completeness (Maximum 40 pts)

Your record book must follow the format of the record book template located on the GCFFY website. The judge will be evaluating whether each section is filled out completely. If something is not applicable to you and your cat, note that with "N.A." Don't leave it blank. The judge will expect more detail from older youth than from younger ones. Focus only on the current project year, however previous years can be referenced and/or included at the end of your record book. If you need more space for any item, insert an additional page following the page where you ran out of space. Repeat the subject or questions above your extended answer.

Neatness (Maximum 20 pts)

Juniors may use pencil to write their responses. Be sure it is dark enough for the judge to read easily. Older youth should print legibly in ink. Type written record books will require prior approval from the project superintendent. Numerous erasures (or whiteout corrections) mean you should probably redo the page. Grammar and correct spelling are also part of neatness.

Creativity (Maximum 15 pts)


You may use a duotang, 3ring binder or 4H record book folder. The cover may be decorated in any manner, but must remain same size as your binder or duotang. Stickers, extra photo pages, your own artwork, and ribbons you earned, etc. will be judged as elements of creativity.

Goals and Summary (Maximum 25 pts)

Clear realistic goals for project year. Goals should show growth and interest in learning from the project. As the exhibitor ages, the goals should be more challenging. Summary should be a statement for each goal as to what was learned, problems, successes and what, if anything, you would do differently.
